Church Voter Guides is an independent 508c1a faith-based nonprofit organization. We serve the public by providing objective research and education on matters specifically of interest to Christians, primarily through the production and distribution of 501c3-compliant, nonpartisan Voter Guides.

Church Voter Guides does not endorse or oppose any candidates for public office or any political party.

We are based in Colorado Springs, and the 2021 City Council election in our hometown is our inaugural project. Our Voter Guide for this election is being distributed electronically, both through our interactive website and by downloadable and printable PDF files, one for each electoral district. It is being promoted through a wide-ranging network of area churches, faith-based non-profit organizations, mainstream and social media, and other means.

What makes a Voter Guide 501c3-Compliant and Nonpartisan?

Federal tax law permits nonprofit 501c3 organizations to develop and distribute materials about political candidates' positions on issues, in order to educate voters impartially and on a nonpartisan basis, meaning that it is free from party affiliation, bias, or designation. The IRS states that 501c3 organizations may conduct any range of activities to promote voter participation and educate voters so long as it is nonpartisan. But, 501c3 organizations are explicitly prohibited from supporting or opposing candidates for public office.

501c3 nonprofits MAY:

- Conduct or Promote Voter Registration
- Educate Voters on the Voting Process
- Distribute Nonpartisan Sample Ballots, Candidate Questionnaires, or Voter Guides
- Organize Get-Out-the-Vote Activities
- Encourage and Help People to Vote
- Educate the Candidates on Issues Important to Your Organization
- Continue to do Issue Advocacy During an Election



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INTRODUCTION TO THE VOTER GUIDE

So, first and foremost: Church Voter Guides does NOT endorse or oppose any candidates for public office or any political party.

Second, all of our staff and volunteers are required to act in a nonpartisan manner when working for or representing the organization and the creation of the Voter Guide.

Third, we do not edit, revise, or editorialize candidate responses to our Questionnaire. We do not even correct typos. Candidate answers are published verbatim, ensuring that their responses accurately represent their positions and perspectives on these issues. We then simply share this information through the Voter Guide, and you decide whom you believe to be the best candidate.

The purpose of our Voter Guides is to educate and inform voters of each candidate's positions on a variety of policy issues that they are likely to address if elected. As a Voter Guide designed to be distributed through Churches, we ask the candidates questions on topics that are of utmost interest to the Christian voter.

To be fair and impartial, we reached out by email and phone to all 21 candidates running for City Council in the 2021 Colorado Springs Municipal Election to be held on April 6th, inviting them to answer our Questionnaire. Two never responded; of the rest, most chose to participate, while some did not. Candidate information is presented in the same order as the Candidates are listed on the ballot. If a Candidate did not respond at all, or did not choose to participate, or did not choose to respond to certain answers in the Questionnaire, then that is noted where applicable.

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CITY COUNCIL RESPONSIBILITIES / DISTRICT CANDIDATES

As the legislative branch of government for the City of Colorado Springs, council members are elected to four-year terms and are paid an annual stipend of \$6,250. They are responsible for:

- Appointing the city auditor and the council administrator
- Approving the city budget
- Establishing tax rates
- Serving as the governing board of Colorado Springs Utilities
- In its role as Colorado Springs Utilities Board of Directors, appointing the Chief Executive Officer
- Setting policies and passing ordinances and resolutions to govern the city
- Performing the Mayor's duties in his/her absence (President of council)
- City Council Rules and Procedures

GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION | APRIL 6, 2021

The City Clerk will be mailing ballot packets for the April 6, 2021 General Municipal Election to registered, active voters who reside within the corporate boundaries of the City of Colorado Springs on Friday, March 12, 2021. If you do not receive your ballot packet by March 17, 2021, please contact the City Clerk's Office. The April 6, 2021 election is an all-mail ballot election only. City elections have been mail ballot only since 2005.

The six (6) City Council District races are up for election this time. Each voters' ballot will contain the specific City Council District race for his or her area and one ballot issue question.


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COLORADO SPRINGS ELECTORAL DISTRICT MAP

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MILITARY / OVERSEAS BALLOTS

What does UOCAVA mean?

UOCAVA means Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act

Am I a UOCAVA voter?

UOCAVA electors are:

- A member of the Uniformed Services or Merchant Marines on active duty, absent from their place of residence;
- An eligible spouse or dependent of the member described above; or
- A U.S. citizen residing outside the U.S.

Can I receive my ballot by email or fax?

If you wish to register as a UOCAVA voter or request to vote electronically, please visit the El Paso County Elections(link is external) site for more information. UOCAVA Ballots will be sent out on February 15th.

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FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT IS A MAIL IN BALLOT?

A mail ballot election provides every eligible active voter, residing within the limits of the City of Colorado Springs, a ballot indicating the issues and candidates for their specific City Council District. The mail ballot packet is mailed to the address listed on voter registration records.

All active voters will receive a ballot mailed to the mailing address shown on the voter registration records unless a request for an absentee ballot is received (see information below). If you have moved or changed addresses and have not updated your voter registration, the ballot will not be forwarded and will be returned to the City Clerk's Office as undeliverable.

WHAT DOES THE MAIL BALLOT MEAN TO ME?

- There will be no voting at precinct polling places.
- There will be no early voting.

WHEN WILL YOU MAIL THE BALLOTS?

We anticipate mailing ballots on March 12, 2021. If you do not receive a ballot by Wednesday, March 17, 2021, and believe you are an eligible active voter within the City limits, contact the City Clerk's Office at (719) 385-5901, option 4 or email us at elections@coloradosprings.gov (link sends e-mail).

WHAT IS THE TYPICAL RETURN RATE FOR MAIL BALLOTS?

Historical voter turnout (the percentage of total votes counted divided by active registered voters) can be found on our Election Archives page coloradosprings.gov/election-history. Just look for the Results Summary. If you are curious about the daily volume of ballots scanned, you can review the Daily Reports for the last four municipal elections. Election Daily Reports.

The Daily Report indicates the number of ballots scanned each day of processing beginning, March 13, 2021.

Per City Code 5.1.102 we only mail to active registered electors. If you are inactive and wish to vote, see HOW DO I GET A BALLOT IF I AM INACTIVE? below.

HOW CAN I FIND OUT THE RESULTS OF THE ELECTION?

Unofficial results of the City Election will be posted on coloradosprings.gov/election. The initial unofficial results should be available by 7:30 PM. Additional updates to the unofficial results will be posted throughout the evening until all ballots have been counted.

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

CITY COUNCIL'S PURPOSE

What do you view as the purpose and role of the Colorado Springs City Council?

ANSWER:

The purpose is to lead and treat all people with dignity and respect. Create policy and ordinances that are fair and just for all people. Land use and zoning is a huge job that requires working with developers and city staff in order to make the best decisions possible for our city. Also, provide oversight and recommendations by serving as the board of utilities directors. Work together with colleagues, city staff and community respecting each other's perspectives having thoughtful conversations to come up with meaningful decisions. Be intentional in involving community and be more inclusive in the current decision-making process.

CANDIDATE'S FOCUS/EXPERTISE/INITIATIVES:

What are your areas of special focus and/or expertise, and what initiatives would you like to undertake as a Colorado Springs City Councilperson?

ANSWER:

I have listed a few of my priorities on my website where people can visit at www.reginaenglish.com and reach out should they have any questions. In this capacity you have to be able to listen, learn, lead and work well with others to make tough decisions that will benefit all people. I am equipped to do this job from life experiences. I understand the community. I am a business owner and currently the Vice President of the Harrison School District Two Board of Education creating policy, making tough decisions for 11,000 + students by making sure that equity is present in policy in order for ALL students to be set up for a fair and successful education. I have several initiatives that I would like to create that will involve inclusion, diversity, community members, students, churches and organizations that are willing to collaborate with the focus on bridging the gap where there is lack to help with civic engagement, civic responsibility, leadership and creating grass-roots initiatives that will prepare our communities and make sure that all people have the resources, opportunities and access to thrive.

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COVID RECOVERY:

Has the COVID situation created any problems in Colorado Springs that the City Council can mitigate; specifically regarding businesses, schools, healthcare systems, and other vital services?

ANSWER:

Yes! We all know that COVID has created problems and have shut down many small businesses which is very unfortunate. ACCESS is very important at this time and the city should be instrumental in this process by providing funding through grants or other city means available to empower small businesses, provide more affordable housing, work with businesses in order for constituents to be provided a living wage to sustain their families and not be pushed out of the communities we love, help schools with resources that are needed, make sure that All people have equitable access to healthcare working with the County to make sure that everyone that would like the vaccine has access to do so and work with churches, organizations and community members to ensure that vital services are being offered especially to our vulnerable population. (unhoused neighbors)

HOME RULE:

Colorado Springs has the status of a "Home Rule City" under the Colorado State Constitution. What are your views on Home Rule, and how would you suggest strengthening the Colorado Springs city charter to protect our residents from state and federal laws that are not in our best interest?

ANSWER:

I support Home Rule City. We must protect ourselves from laws that are not in our best interest at any level of government. All laws can be strengthened to make sure they are in the best interest of the people they serve. This is one that should be looked into to reflect how we as a city would like to be governed

UTILITIES/INFRASTRUCTURE:

City Council members sit on the Utilities Board. What, if anything, should be done to address the city's current and future energy needs as Colorado Springs continues to grow?

ANSWER:

We must be intentional on growing responsibly. The future of how we use energy has come to a point where it must be diversified and a back up plan must also be in place for sustainability. Everyone must work together in this process as we are growing rapidly. One of the most important factors is to make sure that utility rates stay at the lowest rate possible for the customers it serves.

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RECREATIONAL MARIJUANA:

What are your views on permitting the sale of recreational marijuana within the city limits of Colorado Springs?

ANSWER:

My view is to not take the right of the people away and allow this to be a ballot measure to be voted on by the people which is the right thing to do. I support this just as we all would want the same grace extended to us in the event we wanted to see something that we care about on the ballot. This is what working together as a city would look like! Allow the people to decide and when and if it passes it can be safely regulated and this industry would deserve to be treated fairly just like the rest of our businesses here in the city.

2ND AMENDMENT SANCTUARIES:

It has been suggested that Colorado Springs should become a 2nd Amendment "sanctuary city". What are your views on this issue?

ANSWER:

My view is that guns should only be in the hands of responsible people. My family and I were victims of gun violence and not a day goes by that I do not relive that moment, but by the grace of God my family and I are still here to advocate against gun violence. This is a subject that would need more conversation around it for me and I am sure for many people that have been impacted by gun violence.

PROTECTING LIFE:

What legal means, if any, would you support to protect the most vulnerable in our city, including the lives of the unborn, the trafficked, and the elderly?

ANSWER:

All lives should be protected.

BUSINESS/JOB:

What specifically should the City Council do to bring more businesses/jobs to Colorado Springs?

ANSWER:

Bringing new businesses to a city is part of what makes a city thrive and it also boosts tourism which I am for. However, in the light of COVID and seeing how this has negatively impacted small businesses throughout our city I believe that the focus right now should be empowering small businesses by providing grant dollars or city general funding to help boost our local economy and help businesses that have been impacted keep their employees working to sustain their families. We have many vacant buildings that can be incentivized to start businesses that would provide access and opportunities for community.

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HOMELESSNESS/VAGRANCY:

How can the City Council address the increase in the homeless/vagrant population in our city in ways that best serve all Colorado Springs residents?

ANSWER:

ACCESS, ACCESS, ACCESS! Providing more affordable housing for families would help curb this issue of our unhoused neighbors, a living wage would sustain many families, and providing more access and resources so that our shelters can adequately house and help more people in need. The PlanCos is a start but could definitely be enhanced in this area.

CONSTITUTIONAL LIBERTIES:

As a City Councilperson, what measures will you champion to protect the individual Constitutional liberties of all Colorado Springs residents, such as freedom of speech, peaceable assembly, and exercise of religion?

ANSWER:

I will champion them all because they are all equally important.
